INTRODUCTORY LUNCHEON COMMENTS by BOB HART '63



"Fellow alumni, students, and friends of Miami University. It is indeed a pleasure for me to be with you on this historic occasion. My wife, Rita, and my friends will tell you that I am a dreamer; I think of myself as an innovative dreamer, and this event is a dream that has become a reality. I am pleased to have been asked to participate in bringing this occasion to fruition. By virtue of what we see, what we are here today, it should be noted by all that the black family of Miami University is alive and well and is poised to make its move to become a collective, viable and integral entity within the total Miami family. This is my personal belief and some of you may wish to categorize my feelings as another dream. Based on discussions I had with some of you last night, I am not alone in my dream and I encourage each of you to share in making it reality.

"Those of us who have served on the steering committee found that our first major task, which is incomplete, was to determine who we are and where we are. Overall there is yet much to be accomplished. This is barely the beginning. Ours is a special history, which is not yet documented, but which should be for those who follow us.

"At this point, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you the Master of Ceremonies for this event, one of my best friends who has played a major role in making this weekend a reality. He, too, is a dreamer, but because of his strong mathematics orientation, he is a more methodical and practical dreamer than I. Along with a few others, some of whom are present, he and I have been dreaming and planning together for years, trying to find a way to make a Black alumni family a viable factor in the scheme of things here in Oxford. He is one of the most positive persons I've ever known. Over the years since we met in 1959, I have had countless opportunities to see him in action. Based on my observations, I have concluded that he couldn't be negative if his life literally depended on it. Ladies and gentlemen, Bill Madison, Class of '61:"

TOWERS ROOM LUNCHEON SPEECH by WILLIAM "BILL" J. MADISON III '61, reunion chairman and a three-year member of the Alumni Association Board of Directors.



"Good afternoon. I am pleased to have served as Chairman of the Black Alumni Reunion Steering Committee. On behalf of that committee, the Miami University Alumni Association, and the Administration, I welcome you to the first Black Alumni Reunion.

"We are proud of you and your accomplishments and appreciate your return to Oxford. This is a historical event which some said would not occur. But because of your interest and feelings for your classmates, it did happen. I am honored and pleased to have been a part of it.

"Two years ago, a good friend, Paula Smith, and I sat in Di Paolo's (a Beech Street restaurant) and reminisced. As a result of that conversation, the idea of a reunion was tested with several people, Larry Young, Bob Hart, Joe and Barbara Cox, Pete and Darla Knox. There was interest, but the conclusion reached was that an event like this had to be supported fully by the Alumni Association and University administration. Therefore the idea was submitted to and endorsed by the Board of Directors of the Miami University Alumni Association. A steering committee of Black Miamians from the 30's to the 80's was formed and began work last fall. In less than a year, this historical event was developed and implemented. The theme "Coming Together Again" is now a happening.

"The reason you are here is to have a pleasurable and enjoyable experience, to **remember** your classmates and your friends, their successes, and memories of your experiences while at this University, to **renew** your relationship with the people you remember at this University. Finally, to **reflect** on the future and whether you desire to be a part of a growing diverse Miami University. Later, suggestions regarding your participation will be provided. The Rev. Calvin Harper '62 will now lead us in the invocation."

"Gracious and Eternal God, Our Heavenly Father, we thank you for making this first minority reunion possible. We pray that this will be the beginning of a series of reunions in which we will be able to gather to have fun, fellowship, and make plans to help other minorities who are presently at Miami, and those who are yet to come . . . We thank you for the lives of our departed classmates who touch us in so many beautiful ways. May their memory spur us to greater heights . . . We thank you for the food we are about to receive, for the nourishment of our bodies. We ask your blessings upon it. In your mighty name we pray. Amen."

Bill Madison continued: "Please recognize with me the persons at the head table. These leaders of the reunion served as committee heads: Larry Young, alumni search and mailing lists; Bob Hart, evaluation; and Barbara and Joe Cox, reunion activities. Dr. John Millett, president emeritus, at Miami from 1953-65. Three people about whom more will be said later, Louise Clark McBain, Rev. Donald Jordan, and Larry Young. President and chair of the Miami University Alumni Association Board of Directors, Cheryl Gabe '69 MEd '72, and the Steering Committee."

REV. CALVIN HARPER '62 gave the invocation and closing remarks. Following are excerpts from his prayer:

After the luncheon, Bill continued: "A proper way to introduce this portion of the luncheon is to present four letters from Black Miamians who could not attend or who expressed some comments you need to hear. First, from the Class of '40, Mr. Lewis Pleasant, Philadelphia, Pa. 'Thank you for remembering me concerning the 1985 Black Reunion. I am sorry that I will not be able to attend. I hope the committee and alumni who attend will have a grand time.'

"Second, from the class of '47, Mr. Albert D. Williams, Fairfield, Pa.: 'This is to acknowledge the material you have been sending me. I noted the list and checked many Oxford persons. I was born and reared in Oxford, graduated from the old Oxford High School in 1924, and attended its 50th anniversary. I am the uncle of the late Gilbert Williams, former Mayor of Oxford. Sorry I can't be present. Please remember me to my Oxford group. Best wishes for a good reunion.'

"Third, from the class of '51, Ms. Isabel Cheeks Lewis, Minneapolis, Minn.: 'I look forward to attending the Alumni Weekend on June 14-16. Since we have been in Minnesota for 31 years, I am hoping to see many old friends and to meet some new alumni members. It might be wise to use this occasion to share some past history and to recognize Black alumni, who in a sense paved the way for those who followed, such as Myldred Boston Howell '49, one of the first Black students permitted to live in a campus dormitory in 1945. Prior to that time, Oxford residents opened their homes and hearts and provided support for Black students. Thomas Cheeks '29, recipient of a 1976 Bishop Medal. I served a three-year term on the Alumni Association Board of Directors, as did Joseph Young '59, Joe Cox '61, Lloyd Phillips '62, and Bill Madison '61. Currently, Ronnie Gary '80 and Robert Greer '65 are on the board. Perhaps you have already included my concerns on the programs, but if not, please reflect on them. Thank you.'

"Fourth, from the Class of '73, Debbie Jackson, Columbus: 'I didn't get back to you in time to get my name on the list of alumni attending, but I'll be attending. I'm the sister of Darla Jackson Knox '63 and Delores Jackson Coles '64, who will be attending. In 1970, I was the first and only Black Homecoming Queen at Miami, representing my sorority, Delta Sigma Theta. It was a historical event. I would like to be acknowledge as making history at Miami, as some of the older and more recent alumni aren't aware of this honor. I would appreciate your letting my fellow alumni know another achievement has been made.'

"We are a diverse, dynamic, and determined group of people. To reflect this determination, here are three Miamians to relate our achievement and hardships in Oxford.

"First, Louise Clark McBain '32 MA '44, an educator in Dayton and Middletown, a community leader who has served on the Board of Directors of Butler County Tuberculosis and Health Association, Citizen's Council on Human Relations, Middletown Teacher's Association, Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority, and American Association of University Women. At Miami, she lettered in soccer, track, hockey, volleyball, and basketball and was president of the Ivy League Club."

WHAT IT WAS LIKE WHEN I WAS HERE: "I would like to quote a few lines from an oral history study I was privileged to be a part of several years ago in Middletown. I graduated from Middletown in 1928 and went to Miami in the fall. We couldn't live in a dorm, so we lived with a nice colored family. The lady was the vegetable lady at a girls dining hall. She arranged that anytime we didn't have classes we could go pare vegetables for 25¢ an hour. We'd do that up to five hours a week. That was our spending change, our stocking money, or our show money. The

sororities would have teas in the dorm. We would go over and bring the tea in from the kitchen, see that the cookie plate was filled, and we'd get paid for it.

"We only came home at Christmas and spring break. At Thanksgiving Miami played U.C. The colored kids would get together at somebody's house in town; their parents would have us for Thanksgiving dinner; and we'd listen to

the game on radio like a lot of other kids who didn't go to the game. The prom was interesting because we were not invited. The colored kids just went over to the gym, up the fire escapes on the outside, and looked in at our classmates dancing. The irony of it was that they had a black band, McKenny's Cotton Pickers.

"We lived with Mr. and Mrs. Byrd on Oak Street. Their house was approved by the University to house colored girls. We had sign-in-out sheets from the dean's office. When we were ready to go out in the evening, we signed out, name, where you were going (usually we wrote Library wherever we were going), and what time you expected to return. We were always frightened that if we didn't get back exactly on time that we'd get kicked out of the university. At the end of each week, Mrs. Byrd faithfully turned the sheets in to Dean Hamilton. We paid Mrs. Byrd the same amount for room and board as did students on campus. We did have three good meals a day.

"It was a way of life. We were not terrible unhappy because we could not live in the dorms. We had attended high school with white students, if you please, and we were used to them in the classroom. I don't know that anybody stayed up all night long worrying about. I stayed up all night long studying the indispensable discipline called calculus.

"Participation was important to me. This is my story. I am sure that any of us who attended in those days would have his own story to tell. When I arrived at Miami, I thought I wanted to be a gym teacher and a math teacher. In those days there were no programs or classes set up for certification to be a gym teacher, so I decided that I'd like to participate in athletics. I mentioned it to a former student who was a black lady. She said, 'You won't be chosen for a team. If you were, you'd probably have the position left outside.' This hurt a little bit. Soon it was time for the freshmen soccer team tryouts. I wanted to try out, believe me. I knew in class that the teacher had asked me on occasion to show how to stop a ball or to pass a ball, yet I thought that I did not want to be 'left outside,' so I did not go to tryouts. The next gym class the teacher said to me, 'Miss Clark, I looked for you at the tryouts.' I thought, 'All

right.' The next time there was a tryout for anything, I went out for the team. I made the basketball team, track team, soccer team, field hockey team, and whatever there was to make.

"In those days, the women had a highly organized Women's Athletic Association. Each time we made a team, you received so many points. With a number of points, you would get a numeral; mine was 32. The numeral was worn on the pocket of your sweater. For many more points you would receive a block M. For many, many more points you would receive the old English M. The final crowning glory was to receive the athletic sweater on which to wear the 'M.' I received mine. I think in those days a few of us were extroverts. We accomplished some things whether or no.

"There were three black students in my graduating class. In those days we could not do practice teaching on the white children, so Miami put one hundred dollars apiece on our heads and sent us to Xenia where there was a colored high school. We knew that if you kept up your grades and got your assignment, you would go to Xenia to do practice teaching. In fact, after the first six weeks, we just lived to do practice teaching because then you knew you would get your degree and get going with your life. We would do six weeks solid rather than one hour a day for a semester as other students did.

"It's interesting that after I was 50 years old and looked back on the situation, that as soon as Miami University found out that I supposedly was a good teacher, they sent 12 white students to Middletown to do practice teaching in my classroom.

"While I was here a group of colored and white students met at a church with a professor to talk about times and how they could be better and what perhaps maybe should happen. One young Caucasian said, 'I could sit down and eat with you students, or I could have a coke with you downtown (which we couldn't do in those days—we couldn't do it in Middletown either), but if my mother found out, she would withdraw my funds.' Perhaps some students were ready in those days, but their parents were not.

"I was having trouble with botany my first semester. I

went to talk with the professor hoping he could give me some study tips. He said, 'I grade your paper the same as I grade the other students. How are you getting along in your other courses?' I said, 'I got an A in freshman math.' He had respect for me after that. Believe me, I lived eight semesters at Miami University on the A I got the first time grades came out.

"Dr. Christofferson was my mentor and recommended me for student teaching. A few years after graduation, while I was teaching at Dayton Dunbar, he sent a letter to me suggesting that I come back to Miami and get a master's degree so that I might teach other students to do what I was doing. With his encouragement, I worked summers and in extension courses and received my M.A. in 1944. I point that out because several years later I was registering for a graduate course, the lady said, 'You have not been admitted to our graduate school.' I said, 'Lady, I have a master's from over here—an M.A. for which I wrote a thesis.' She said, 'We didn't have a graduate school in those days. There was a graduate committee who directed you through courses leading to a master's degree.'

"At the graduation where I received my M.A., there were eight of us—seven of them and one of me. Fortunately for me, I was able to talk 150 ninth graders at Dayton Dunbar into taking a series of eight tests including some on socio-economic background. I needed the test scores for my thesis so that I could make some observations. The title was (it's in the Library if you want to read it) 'What Are The Relationships, If Any, Between Social And Economic Background And School Achievement.' I wanted to know if the kids who had the money always made the best grades. My study showed not necessarily so. My thesis professor, Dr. Edmiston, reviewed my thesis in **School and Society** with editorial offices in New York City.

"While I was here the black students developed a fraternity. We were excited about the white sororities and fraternities. There weren't enough black men on campus to have a fraternity and not enough black women to have a sorority. So, we thought we would have a soror-frat, which we called a fraternity, Kappa Sigma Delta. We thought it might catch on across the nation on campuses similar to ours. We developed leadership through our fraternity

because we had to do our own thing. We had dances at old Oxford High School, inviting people from town and our high school friends from Hamilton and Middletown.

"The ladies from Cincinnati got permission from the dean to establish an Ivy Leaf Club to feed into the Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority chapter in Cincinnati. We were initiated into that chapter. A few of the men went Omega Psi Phi on the Wilberforce campus.

"At one time while I was here there were eight blacks enrolled. At other times there were fewer. In my graduating class there were three of us, myself and two Oxford girls, Margaret Greene McClain (now in Akron) and Gwendolyn Bolden Swaney (now in Frederick, Md.)"

"Our second speaker is Rev. Donald H. Jordan '54, owner of Hall-Jordan Funeral Homes in Middletown, Hamilton, Lockland, and Cincinnati, and pastor of the Quinn Chapel AMA Church in Forest Park. He was instrumental in building a new church and is in the process of developing a condominium complex, medical center and church educational facility, a \$5 million dollar project. His activities

include past member of the Butler County Community Action Commission, Second Ward Community Center Board of Hamilton, and Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity."

REMARKS BY REV. JORDAN: (Editor's Note: Rev. Jordan put his extemporaneous remarks into writing for the Reunion Record.) "My first reference was to the apartheid society that I encountered upon arriving on the campus, Sept. 1950. Speaking here directly about the fraternity-sorority situation, the social conscience as refers to the Redskin Reservation and black students frantically engaged in playing Whiss. I spoke of hitchhiking from Middletown and working as a janitor during all those years.

"Reference was made to the leadership role of Peter Knox, a '63 graduate of Miami, in the planning, development and building of our new church edifice in Forest Park; this was used to point out the multi-faceted leadership ability of Miami graduates in the black community, none of which the university now calls upon.

"There was some reminiscing about the social structures then, Knoxies store, the stables, etc. Also, I recall speaking about the mock democratic convention in 1952, when a group of Pi Kappa Tau's, I believe, representing the confederacy, wanted to nominate Richard Russell of Georgia, thereby tainting the reputation of the university. It was then that some faculty members who played a part in this, namely Dr. Black, saw the image problems with this for the university. I was allowed to address that huge assembly in Withrow Court and promptly put the entire university on notice that change was here and that never again, in thought or action, would this kind of behaviour be tolerated at Miami, either officially or unofficially, in jest or in realism. I recalled the **Miami Student** carried this address on its front page, with picture, and the mood that swept the campus, to change.

"There was the usage of that phrase which Robert Kennedy used often; some see things as they are, and ask why; others see things that never were, and ask why not?

"Then I threw this out: If we prepare ourselves, physically, mentally, morally, intellectually, and spiritually, then, only we ourselves can halt our rise to destiny; bigotry can't stop us; segregation can't stop us; discrimination can't stop us. I referred here to John Winthrop's poem which

talked about a city on a hill. Reagan used this successfully, though out of context, in his campaign. We are indeed a city set on a hill, but if we fail in our obligation to those less fortunate than ourselves, then we are forever demand.

"That's the basic thesis of this poem. I closed with this: if we believe and trust in the God of our fathers, then all things will be made plain; every mountain will be made low; every valley exalted, for mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord, and his truth is marching on."

Rev. Jordan concluded his written remarks with, "I thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity and the privilege; it was good to see so many old friends, but more than that, it was good to see Black Miami together. I didn't believe that I would live to see that day."

Bill Madison continued: "Our third speaker is Larry Young '65 MEd '74, currently serving as director of the Paul Robison Cultural Center, Pennsylvania State University. Formerly director of minority student affairs at Miami, he is considered to be 'Mr. Miami' by hundreds of students because he explained the rules, held their hands, wiped their noses, patted their backs and butts, and was the person Black students depended on. He also was a prime motivator for this reunion.

REMARKS by LARRY YOUNG: "After Rev. Jordan's ringing and emotional speech, it may be hard to believe that they saved the best for last, but I assure you that they did. I wish to thank the committee for extending this opportunity to me to address this group of old and new friends.

"Both Bob Hart and Bill Madison have called this a dream come true. Along with our dreams, there was an awful lot of love. At this awesomely significant occasion in Miami's history, I can feel the love filling up this room. I am proud to be here in the presence of those forerunners who preceeded me here and fought untold battles with too few weapons and even fewer allies.

"I am so pleased to be here again with so many who accompanied me through my years at Miami and who sustained me with comfort, joy, solace, and enduring

friendship. I am delighted to be here in the company of so many who succeeded me, those who picked up the torch and carried it on to new heights of achievement and honor.

"We have accomplished so very much more than some believed we were capable of and our very presence here today attests to the magnitude of our achievement.

"We recognize that music plays a vital role in Afro-American life. A song called 'How I Got Over' addresses the trials of a people. The history of the period 1960-1980 is a testament of how we got over.

"The history of those times includes events that we all remember, some vaguely, others as if they happened yesterday, including: the election of John F. Kennedy as president; first sit-ins by students in N. Carolina; creation of the Peace Corps; first manned space flight; first freedom rides; first troops sent to Vietnam; James Meridith enrolls at University of Mississippi; Meadgar Evers is shot; M. L. King's 'I Have A Dream' speech; four little girls blown up in Birmingham; Kennedy is assassinated; a Civil Rights law is passed; King wins Nobel Peace Prize—Johnson is elected—Malcolm X is assassinated—Selma—Watts—125,000 troops in Vietnam—first Black cabinet member—first Black professional sports coach—Black Power—James Meridith is shot—300,000 troops in Vietnam—Adam Clayton Powell stripped of his congressional seat—Ali stripped of his title—Detroit—Thurgood Marshall appointed to Supreme Court—486,000 troops in Vietnam—My Lai massacre—Martin Luther King assassinated—Bobby Kennedy assassinated—Black Panther Party formed—550,000 troops in Vietnam—Nixon elected—Man walks on the moon—Woodstock—Chicago seven trials—Jackson State massacre—Kent State massacre—George Wallace is shot—Watergate—Agnew resigns—oil embargo—Nixon resigns—Ali regains his crown—U.S. gets out of Vietnam—Bicentennial—Jimmy Carter—Bakke case decided—two popes die—Three-mile Island—Zimbabwe gains majority rule—Andrew Young resigns—hostages held in Iran—Olympics boycotted—and Ronald Reagan is elected.

"The words to Miami's alma mater speak of an 'old Miami and a new Miami.' We always knew that there were two Miami's, a white and a Black. W. E. B. DuBois tells of the double consciousness of the Afro-American, his awareness of two worlds, and so it has been with us that we experienced two histories at Miami. There was a history that was recorded in the **Miami Student**, **Recensio**, and **The Miami Years**, and then there was another history. A history that we, the Black alumni, have collectively and simultaneously recorded in our psyches. It is **we** who must be sure that our history is recorded correctly.

"Because the music is such a powerful stimulant and so universally shared among us, it is very useful in recalling our history. Think with me for a moment if you will and remember the events and images you recall when you hear these song titles: (Editor's Note: The following titles were

selected by Larry from 204 mentioned as representative.) A Fool in Love, Shop Around, Daddy's Home, How Many Times, Our Day Will Come, The Tracks of My Tears, Bend Over Let Me See You Shake A Tail Feather, Heard it Through the Grapevine, Everyday People, The Sly, The Slick, The Wicked, Whatcha See Is Whatcha Get, Back Stabbers, Could It Be I'm Falling In Love, Jungle Boogie, Misty Blue, Easy, Be My Girl, Always and Forever, Ring My Bell, Firecracker, and Rapper Delight.

"Hopefully some of the outstanding events here on campus came to your mind as well. There was the stabilizing influence of Mrs. Sally Faulkner Smith '57 as advisor to the Allen Foundation which gave us guidance and strength as well as a base of operations. The Allen Foundation was a forerunner of the Black Student Action Association. Several founders of BSAA are here and should be recognized. We regret that the first president of BSAA, Paul Payne '69, is unable to join us on this historic occasion. BSAA was the catalytic force that gave birth to many of the positive changes here for Black students. The leaders and members of BSAA were often called upon to put their careers and more on the line to effect change here and future generations will hopefully recognize the debt owed to those who went before them.

"You know there is a continuous social thread that runs from the parties Mrs. McBain described to those that Rev. Jordan described, up to those that Scott Tyler '65 gave after each U.C. football game in Cincinnati, and now includes those put on by the ball players at the end of the season at Fox and Hounds or Candlewood Terrace.

"Socially, life here has always been a series of highs and lows, ups and downs, or maybe even overs and unders. We were always partying under some place like the basements of Scott, Minnich, or Hamilton, the Smith basement, later Hepburn, Martin, Western College, or Flower. If it wasn't an under, it was an over as in over the police station, over the bank, or over townhall with our 'Happy Feet.' We know now we have truly arrived on a high since tonight we are going to party over the Res in the Towers Room.

"1969 saw the establishment of the Office of Black Student Affairs, later Office of Minority Student Affairs led by Kenneth McDowell, who is here today. Dr. Heanon Wilkins, first Director of the Educational Opportunity Program, is unable to be with us today. That year also saw the advent of the Black Studies Program so ably led by Dr. Marion Musgrave, who is also unable to be here. The 'firsts' from that period include: first Black Homecoming Queen, Debora Kay Jackson '73; first Black cheerleader, Belinda Church '69; first Black Shakerette, Roberta Belle Roberts '75; first Black Homecoming King, Michael A.J. Randolph '81; and first Black academic department chairpersons, Samuel Bennett '53 in music and Joseph Cox '61 in art.

"There was an expression out of the sixties that said, 'What goes around, comes around.' We recognize that circular nature of our experience when we can stand here and give recognition to John Cager '87, first Black Student Government president and realize that his sister, Cynthia Robinson-Orudugha '70, was one of the first members of BSAA and of Delta Sigma Theta. The period witnessed the growth of greek letter organizations at Miami from the solo of Alpha Phi Alpha to the establishment of active chapters of Delta Sigma Theta, Alpha Kappa Alpha and Kappa Alpha Psi.

"Rather than a circle, however, ours is a spiral with many similarities yet a lot of progress, higher, better, smarter. We have moved from 'the first ...' to 'the next ...'

"I don't want us to spend too much time reveling in our past glories or luxuriating in our current levels of success. As alumni, imprinted with the two histories of Miami, we have much work to do and a vital role to play at our University. It's up to us to truly 'sing the story of the (pain and

glory' for Miami. Our part won't end with a few sweet hours of blissful nostalgia. We must go on to play a part of Miami's future. We know that we can contribute to a better, greater Miami and we must convince her that she needs us.

"Miami must, in return, give her best to all of her sons and daughters. We must ask hard questions of Miami, like why outstanding athletic figures like Johnny Moore '59, Scott Tyler '65, Charles Coles '65, and Al Moore '68 aren't in Miami's Hall of Fame?"

"What goes around comes around, and we have come back around. That which brought all of us here today is a shared history and experience, a shared ambition, a shared dream, and some very powerful and lasting impressions.

"The indescribable pain and unbelievable joy of being Black and living and learning at Miami has contributed mightily to who and what we are today. It's the strength of those forces, universally shared by each one of us, that brought us back to this place at this time and will bring us back again and again.

"The poet, Langston Hughes, said 'The past has been a mint of blood and sorrow that must now be true of tomorrow.' Since the music is so important to us, let's leave with a recent song by Patti LaBelle and Grover Washington as

our motto, 'The Best Is Yet To Come.' ”

Closing remarks by Bill Madison: “Over 60 years of history of Black people at Miami have been reviewed here. Our past needed to be reviewed, recorded, and remembered before we discuss the future. We opened the luncheon with a message, ‘Remember, Renew, Reflect,’ That’s what we’re here for. Now, we suggest another message for your consideration, ‘Time, Talent, Treasure.’ We want you to seriously consider giving one or all three of these items to your University. Specifics about time, talent, and treasure will be provided during the weekend and discussed fully during our wrap-up session in the Morris Hall. You’ll be given an opportunity to respond to the reunion via a questionnaire being distributed. Discuss these matters among yourselves and with members of the Steering Committee.

“Our objectives are: 1—have a successful, enjoyable reunion, 2—develop specific recommendations from Black alumni to present the Alumni Association, 3—establish communication between current Black students and Black alumni.”

Excerpts of closing remarks of Rev. Calvin A. Harper '62 “Even the Bee fertilizes the plant it robs. If you get something out of it, you should put something back into it.

“If we’ve gotten anything from our years at Miami, then we should put something back into Miami.

“Esther 4:14 ‘... and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom **for such a time as this?**’



Marv Lawrence MS '82, assistant dean of the School of Education and Allied Professions, missed the reunion. It coincided with a previously planned trip. His thoughts were in Oxford while he was with his daughter, Stacey, and wife, Mary Glidewell Lawrence '62, in the Swiss Alps near Zurich.

“For such a time as this:

- We Black graduates of Miami have been uniquely prepared for ‘such a time as this.’ We have something to say, we have something to share.
- When Black enrollment in college is dropping all across the country.
- When preparation for college on the part of Black students seem to be on the decline.
- When the cost of a college education is at an all-time high.
- When many of us are wondering whether or not we should send our children to Miami.

“God has brought about this unprecedented gathering of Black graduates of Miami University **‘for such a time as this.’**”

“We have no one but us to depend on. We’re all in this thing together. We have to pool our several resources and do the very best that we can. In times like these, each of us will have to do what we do best.

“A man mans’ A woman womans’ A child childs’

“I Corinthians 13:11: ‘When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became an adult (a man, a woman), I put away childish things.’

“We pray that this will not be our last gathering and that each of us will be willing to do the very best that we can ‘for such a time as this.’ ”
