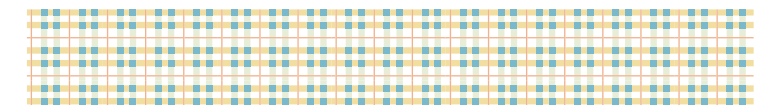
What part of the world do you want to explore? Miami probably has a program there.

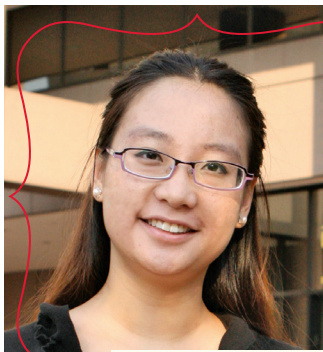
Miami's Luxembourg campus, in the heart of Europe, is one of the many study abroad locations offered by Miami.

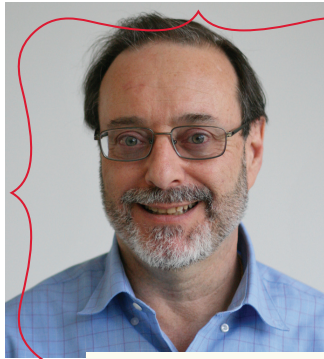

Miami offers special resources for international students.

The Office of International Education provides guidance to students who are accepted for admission. Highly trained advisers help students with:

- Immigration regulations and procedures
- Visa matters
- Health insurance
- Academic and personal counseling

International Student Orientation program (mandatory)

- Learn about important immigration rules and regulations necessary for maintaining your legal status in the U.S.
- Learn about academic life and register for classes.
- Gain knowledge of campus and community resources.
- Have opportunities to meet other new international and domestic students at Miami University.

The American Culture and English Program (ACE)

If needed, this program helps some international students improve their English skills while working toward the college degree. Enjoy excursions, social programs, and much more! Program features include:

- Receive conditional admission to Miami University.
- Earn 15 college credits (an entire semester) toward your Miami University degree.
- Take one mainstream college course outside of the ACE Program.

- Live in a campus residence hall with American students.
- Participate in all aspects of college life.

Your life in the ideal student community.

Miami is a residential campus, which is an important way to connect with other students. In fact, almost all our first- and second-year students live on campus. Studies show that students who live on campus perform better academically, participate more fully in campus life, and because of this, are better prepared for their careers.

Where you live

As a first-year student, you choose a Living Learning Community (LLC) with a theme that interests you. Living with others who have similar interests not only connects you with lifelong friends but also gives you activities to participate in throughout the year.

Airports closest to Oxford

- Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport an hour south of Oxford in northern Kentucky.
- Dayton International Airport an hour northeast of Oxford.
- Port Columbus International Airport two hours northeast of Oxford.
- Indianapolis International Airport two hours northwest of Oxford.

Miami promotes a safe environment

Miami offers many resources to promote student safety. The Miami University Police Department is a full-service agency whose officers patrol campus 24 hours a day and work in partnership with the Oxford Police Department. Residence halls are locked, and resident students have entry access with their Miami I.D. cards. At night, students can use the Miami Metro buses or the Door-to-Door van service.



Admission to Miami University.

During your last year in secondary high school, you may apply as a first-year applicant. If you are already enrolled at a college or university, you may apply as a transfer applicant. Non-U.S. citizens or permanent residents apply as international candidates. Apply at muohio.edu/apply.

Required application materials:

1. Miami Supplement to the Common Application.
2. Common Application (includes essay)
3. \$70 application fee
4. Official or original high school records/transcript (minimum 3-year period), including high school profile if available. Transfer students currently enrolled at a college or university must provide an official college transcript.
5. ONE recommendation letter from teacher (for first-year applicants) or college professor (for transfer applicants)
6. Proof of English proficiency such as TOEFL 80 iBT or IELTS 6.5. Students with slightly lower test scores will be considered for conditional admission. The SAT or ACT is encouraged but NOT required for international students. For SAT, go to collegeboard.org. For ACT, go to actstudent.org.
7. International Student Financial Support Form with supporting documentation
8. Copy of your passport or national identification card

You may submit items 1, 2, and 3 online, and your school



official can submit items 4 and 5 online through the Common Application website. You may scan and email items 6, 7, and 8 to internationaladmission@muohio.edu or fax them to 1-513-529-0682.

Creative Arts majors are required to submit a portfolio or schedule an audition. For more information, visit muohio.edu/arts-apply.

Earn college credit in advance.

Any student entering Miami can submit scores from the Advanced Placement test, given by the College Entrance Examination Board Advanced Placement Program. Acceptable scores range from 3-5.

Miami awards credit for higher level IB subject tests passed at a satisfactory level (minimum scores vary 5 to 7 by subject area). Standard levels are not awarded credit. Departments make the final determinations on credit.

A-level credentials will be considered for college credit upon your enrollment at Miami.

Competitive merit scholarships.

Miami provides merit-based scholarships to high-achieving international students. These awards are competitive and are renewable for up to four years. Students must be first-year, full-time, and enrolled on the Oxford campus for Fall 2013.
