General Service-Learning Language for Faculty Syllabi

Required – The Miami University definition of Service-Learning must appear in your syllabus. Please make sure to always capitalize the S and L and hyphenate. When abbreviating Service-Learning, you may use "SL".

Definition of Service-Learning

Miami University defines Service-Learning as "an experiential pedagogical practice that uses action and reflection to meet needs and enhance learning through mutually beneficial, reciprocal partnerships." Service-Learning involves integrating community service or other forms of engagement into course content. As a result, Miami students are able to gain real world skills and enhance their learning while contributing to the community.

Suggested Language – These items should be included in your syllabus in some way, but you may edit them as needed.

Explanation of Service-Learning Component

This course includes a Service-Learning experience. As a result, this course has the SL (Service-Learning) Designation. You will gain valuable experience putting theory into practice into the community. Due to the fact that Service-Learning broadens perspectives, enhances critical thinking skills, and improves communication skills, graduate schools and employers are increasingly seeking students with experience in Service-Learning and community engagement. Below is information about Service-Learning, followed by the assignment description.

Details of Service-Learning Component (Or – Experience, Assignment, Project, Group Project, etc.) Insert assignment here, with evidence of assessment. Be sure to include the reflection aspect. - Broadens perspectives and enhances critical thinking skills.
- Improves inter-personal and human relations skills, which are increasingly viewed as the most important skills in achieving success in professional and personal spheres
- Provides guidance and experience for future career choice
- Links critical thinking to real-life situations

For the community, Service-Learning:

- Provides substantial human resources to meet its educational, human, safety and environmental needs
- Results in a renewed sense of community and encourages participative democracy
- Provides the opportunity to participate in an educational partnership
- Expands the breadth and depth of their daily initiatives.

Miami as the Engaged University
